


From Our Founder

Changing Lives with Mobility Carts





In schools and villages from the southern coast of Kenya to the far north in Marsabit and east to the Samburu region, the water backpack provides a safe alternative to contaminated jerry cans for transporting and storing water.





Joy Town Primary School in Kiambu County is a special school for physically challenged children. Partners for Care donated 25 water packs to the school. The teachers say they have not had a case of waterborne

illness and there has been a significant improvement in the academic performance since they started using the water pack. The teachers were especially appreciative of the gift for these special children.

The Power of Education to Change a Life


Changing Lives Through Computer Schools

Nelson Mandela said "The greatest way to change a nation is through education."

Susan Wambui, a 37-year-old single mother of two children, sells clothes for a living but struggled with her inability to speak English. With two children to raise, it has been difficult for her to go to school because she cannot afford it despite her desire to do so. When Susan heard about the free literacy class from a friend she was overjoyed and immediately visited the PFC center in Nairobi and enrolled in the class. Susan is doing very well and can now read, write and communicate in English.



Diramu Tadicha is a student currently enrolled in the Marsabit computer school. She is the first born in the family and lives with her five sisters and one brother under the care of a single mother. Their mother is poor and has struggled for years to provide an education for her children. Diramu was referred to the PFC Computer School by a previous graduate and walked six miles to confirm that she could take the class for free. It was music to the ears of Diramu who had lost hope of getting any form of education. She says her future is brighter now because her computer skills will help her to secure employment and support her mother and siblings. She is doing well in the computer class and is thankful to all the donors who support the computer schools.









Jiggers continue to be a menace on the coast of Kenya. Just as Pastor Hirbo did in Marsabit County, the Kilifi PFC staff are committed to eradicating jiggers in the Watamu area. It will take many hands to treat the children. PFC staff are grateful for the help of the Mount Kenya University

students on a recent partnership outreach to treat jiggers in Watamu, Kalifi County.







167 children were treated for the painful infection, and training was provided to help prevent reinfection. The students were touched by the plight of the children and humbled to be of service to them. With the help of our donors, this important work will continue until jiggers are completely eradicated in the area.
